November 29 - First Sunday of Advent

Genesis 1:3-5 (CEB)

God said, "Let there be light." And so light appeared. ⁴God saw how good the light was. God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵ God named the light Day and the darkness Night. There was evening and there was morning: the first day.

Before there was light, there was God. God was before anything we know or understand. As we begin our Advent journey, let us pause to think about the vastness of God.
